2018 marks the beginning of a new era in international touring car racing. The WTCR - FIA World Touring Car Cup ties in with a tradition that Audi started with production-based models. In 1995. Frank Biela with Audi was the last driver to have won a World Touring Car Cup and now two strong teams with six campaigners are representing the colors of Audi Sport customer racing in the new series. They rely on the Audi RS 3 LMS, the entry-level model of the motorsport world of the four rings. The calendar featuring ten rounds around the globe, including four city street circuits, quarantees its presence in Africa,

Asia, Europe and South America. Audi Sport customer racing is taking on its greatest challenge in touring car racing to date. We would be delighted to welcome you at the race tracks in the 2018 season.

A DECADE OF SUCCESS

Audi's customer racing program was launched in 2009, so the anniversary year of 2018 marks Audi Sport customer racing's tenth full season. Following its beginnings in the GT3 category and an Audi TT RS for the VLN Endurance Championship Nürburgring, the program was extended to one-make cups in 2015 with the Audi TT cup. At the end of 2016, the Audi RS 3 LMS followed for the TCR class and in 2017, the brand presented the Audi R8 LMS GT4. The customer racing program is firmly anchored on the four continents of America, Asia, Australia and Europe and encompasses hundreds of races each season.

The winning streak Audi Sport and its customers have been enjoying is comprehensive. In 2017, its first season, the entry-level model Audi RS 3 LMS won 58 single races and five championship titles. Two generations of the Audi R8 LMS for the GT3 category combine eleven overall victories in 24-hour races, seven wins in 12-hour races. 49 titles in overall driver classifications and many other class wins. Plus, the new Audi R8 LMS GT4, on clinching a one-two result in the Dubai 24 Hours in January 2018, made a brilliant start to its first customer racing season.





GLOBAL PLATFORM

Since 2015, the TCR (Touring Car Racing) class has established itself around the globe. A set of identical technical regulations guarantees a wide range of fielding opportunities for the productionbased, cost-efficient race cars. In accordance with the regulations, the compact models use front-wheel drive and four-cylinder turbo engines. Nearly all cars have two liters of displacement. For the TCR class, Audi Sport offers the RS 3 LMS and, together with the Group's Volkswagen and Cupra brands, has created synergies in development, production and service. More than 130 worldwide customers rely on the entry-level race car with the four rings.

Around the globe, the teams are able to compete in some 20 racing series. At national level, two TCR classes exist in North America, plus there are series in China, Germany, Italy, Japan, Korea, Portugal, Russia, Thailand and the United Kingdom. In addition, there are regional competitions in Asia, the Benelux region and one series each for Europe, the Middle Fast and Scandinavia, Hill-climb races or single events like the Nürburgring 24 Hours admit TCR cars as well. Internationally, the 24H TCE Series, the 24H Endurance Series and the WTCR - FIA World Touring Car Cup mark the top end.

PERFECT FOR STARTERS

The Audi RS 3 LMS is cost-efficient, offers high levels of safety and has a power output of up to 257 kW (350 hp). For use in racing, the body, which is produced at the plant in Győr, has only been made lighter, reinforced in some areas and equipped with a steel-tube safety cell. The two-liter fourcylinder TFSI engine has been adopted from production nearly unchanged as well. In the WTCR - FIA World Touring Car Cup, Audi Sport uses the sequential six-speed racing transmission. For customers, the doubleclutch transmission is available as well.

MacPherson struts guide the front wheels and a multilink suspension the rear wheels.

Ride height, toe and camber are continually variable and the front and rear stabilizers are three-way adjustable. In terms of safety, the Audi RS 3 LMS sets standards. Safety features include an FIA-compliant safety fuel cell, a safety cell for racing, the PS3 safety seat, FIA safety nets on both sides of the seat and a rescue hatch in the roof like on the Audi R8 LMS.

An attractive accessory package complements Audi Sport's offering for customers around the globe. It includes a Makrolon windshield, an air conditioning system for helmet cooling and an adjustable pedal box.

Two drivers, respectively, form a squad that jointly battles for points in the teams' classification. Shedden and Vernay compete for Audi Sport Leopard Lukoil Team, Vervisch and Dupont form Audi Sport Team Comtoyou. Berthon and Panis score points for Comtoyou Racing. In addition, there is an individual drivers' classification in the WTCR - FIA World Touring Car Cup.

In the past decade and a half, Gordon Shedden shaped the British Touring Car Championship like nobody else. In 2012, 2015 and 2016, he was champion. In addition, he finished runner-up twice and placed third three times. The Scot celebrated 48 single race wins in the process. His experiences with front-wheel drive touring cars though date back even further because in 2000 he won a onemake cup at home. Shedden, who lived in Hanover for three years in his youth, subsequently earned a degree in business from the University of Edinburgh and today works for the Knockhill Racing Circuit. He calls his legendary Scottish compatriot Jim Clark his role model in racing. Gordon Shedden is particularly excited about the race at Suzuka. He likes sushi, has never been to Japan and looks forward to the mix of cultural tradition and modern life

With two victories and five podium positions in the West European TCR Benelux, he attracted attention. In the one-make Lamera Cup the same year, he won a 24-hour race at Magny-Cours as well. After having won a prize of the RACB National Team in 2015, he has been a member of the Royal Automobile Club of Belgium's talent promotion program since 2016, Podium positions and victories in the TCR Benelux, the GT4 European Cup and three club sport series last year have marked his best season to date. The Frenchman went through Formula 4 and Formula Renault at home and was promoted all the way to Formula Renault 3.5. He lives in Claix near Grenoble, a ski resort in the southeast of France - so his love of ice racing seems natural. In 2015/16 and 2016/17, the son of former Formula 1 driver Olivier Panis finished the Trophée Andros Eléctrique in second place and last winter, he won the electric racing series. In 2017, he gathered initial touring car experience as well and won a race of the TCR International Series in Thailand, For a change of pace from motorsport, he enjoys tennis, soccer, squash and cycling.





TWO STRONG TEAMS

Audi Sport customer racing relies on two teams in the WTCR - FIA World Touring Car Cup. Both are young, hail from Belgium. are very successful and have previously won titles in motorsport with Audi. Audi Sport Leopard Lukoil Team relies on W Racing Team as the fielding team. The company based in Baudour has won all major international series in GT3 racing as well as major 12- and 24-hour endurance races. In TCR racing, the team competes as the title defender. The motorsport squad headed by Vincent Vosse has even been successful in ice racing, a discipline in which Comtoyou Racing clinched a first title with Audi last winter as well. In addition, Jean-Michel Baert's outfit based in Waterloo achieved third place in the TCR International Series.

VARIETY GUARANTEED

With three races per weekend, two qualifying sessions, a reversed grid and ballast in the case of success the WTCR – FIA World Touring Car Cup stands for exciting racing.

Concept

The FIA in 2018 has sanctioned the WTCR – FIA World Touring Car Cup title for the first time and establishes the regulations. Eurosport Events Limited is the series' promoter. The WSC organization that invented the TCR concept and owns the brand rights has signed a two-year licensing agreement, so in 2018 and 2019, TCR cars homologated by the WSC exclusively compete in the FIA WTCR. Three races per weekend are scheduled at ten events on four continents.

Technology

A maximum of one engine and five turbochargers are available to every driver per season. In the first event, a driver may use a maximum of 24 slicks and, from the second event on, a maximum of 28 with a maximum of 20 new ones. The number of wets is limited to 16 per event. The tires may not be pre-heated. Yokohama is the

exclusive supplier to all teams. For each event, a balance of performance applies in order to level the field. In addition, there is a rule for success ballast.

Field

A maximum of 28 parties may submit entries for a season. The FIA accepts two additional participants ("wild cards") who may contest a single event.

Practice and qualifying

On day one of the event, two 30-minute free practice sessions are followed by a first 30-minute qualifying session (40 minutes on city street circuits). On day two, the second qualifying session is divided into three parts. All entrants are allowed to drive for 20 minutes (30 minutes on city street circuits). Only the top twelve will subsequently contest the second ten-minute session (15 minutes on city street circuits). The five fastest drivers move into the third session – the single timed laps.

Race

The grid for race 1 results from the first qualifying session. The second qualifying session determines the starting

order for race two with a reversed grid of the top ten finishers in qualifying. Finally, the grid in race three is determined by the original starting order resulting from the second qualifying session. Standing starts are used in all races

Points system and classification

For each race, there is a separate points system, plus points will be assigned for the second qualifying.

World Cup titles have been sanctioned for the drivers' and teams' classifications. There is no manufacturers' classification. A team may nominate a maximum of two cars to score points in the teams' classification.

Details about the FIA WTCR Race of China-Wuhan were not available yet at the time of going to press.








FOUR DECADES AT THE TOP
