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Audi in the DTM: Aiming for first place at Moscow

- Five Audi drivers hunting leader of the standings Marco Wittmann
- Audi at the top of the teams' and manufacturers' classifications
- Dieter Gass, Head of DTM: "First victory of the season is overdue"

Ingolstadt, July 7, 2014 – The Audi squad is traveling to the DTM's second round in Russia with a clear aim: After seven podium places in the first four races, the first victory of the season is to follow at Moscow next weekend (July 11 to 13). The event marks the season's midpoint and will be held on the long configuration of the Moscow Raceway for the first time.

Audi is showing a strong, cohesive team performance in the 2014 DTM season. Following the first four races, six drivers of the brand are in the top ten of the standings, in positions two to six and nine. Edoardo Mortara, Mattias Ekström and Mike Rockenfeller are trailing leader of the standings Marco Wittman in striking distance and have the chance to bump the BMW driver from the top spot with a victory. In the manufacturers' and teams' classifications, Audi is traveling to Russia as the leader of the standings. Victory is the only thing that is still missing in the track record of the four rings this year.

Chances for a successful weekend at Moscow Raceway, which is about an hour and a half's drive from the center of the city, are good. Last year, the subsequent champion, Mike Rockenfeller, and his brand colleague Mattias Ekström celebrated a commanding one-two victory with an advantage of more than ten seconds, which is untypically large in the DTM. The pole position and the fastest race lap went to Audi as well.

Instead of the short configuration, which is only a little more than 2.5 kilometers long, the DTM will be using the 3.931-kilometer track this year. The new section features a few fast combinations of turns and provides more overtaking opportunities. The end of the long straight in front of the start and finish where the drivers, just before braking, will be reaching a speed of more than 240 km/h this year, continues to offer an optimal



opportunity. TV viewers will get to watch the qualifying session on prime time. 'Das Erste' will be airing live coverage from Moscow on Saturday at 16.35 (CEST) and from 13.15 (CEST) on Sunday. Quotes by the officials

Dieter Gass (Head of DTM): "The first victory of the season has long been overdue for our squad. We've been showing a consistently strong performance with nearly all of our drivers whereas our competitors keep experiencing highs and lows. Our aim for the race at Moscow is to repeat last year's victory – even though we'll be racing on a different configuration of the track. We've got a balanced team performance this year and still have a number of drivers in contention for the championship. This also means that we've got several hot candidates for victory at Moscow in our ranks."

Hans-Jürgen Abt (Team Director Audi Sport Team Abt Sportsline): "Moscow is a race track that suits us really well. We know that from last year and the longer track configuration won't change that. We're proud of providing the best Audi driver and the best Audi team in the standings. Obviously, we'd like to defend these positions and, above all, further reduce the gap to the leading BMW driver."

Ernst Moser (Team Director Audi Sport Team Phoenix): "With Mike's (Rockenfeller) victory last year we've only got fond memories of Moscow. I walked the long track configuration last year and am sure that it'll suit as well. We're aiming to score big points with both cars."

Arno Zensen (Team Director Audi Sport Team Rosberg): "We're looking forward to Moscow and are taking the Norisring success with us as additional motivation. Jamie (Green) drove a strong race in Russia last year."

Mattias Ekström (35/S), Red Bull Audi RS 5 DTM #7 (Audi Sport Team Abt Sportsline)

- In 2013, together with Mike Rockenfeller, was in a class of his own at Moscow
- Drove the fastest race lap at the Norisring

"The race last year was one of the best ones in my DTM career. That's why I'm excited and really looking forward to the weekend. I like the people and the enthusiasm in Russia and am going to give everything to up the ante because the biggest trophy is still missing in my collection this year."



Jamie Green (32/GB), Hoffmann Group Audi RS 5 DTM #21 (Audi Sport Team Rosberg)

- In Nuremberg, clinched the first podium place for Team Rosberg in 2014
- As the runner-up at the Norisring, scored his best result for Audi

"I really enjoyed the trip to Moscow last year – even though getting to and from the airport to the hotel and the race track may be a bit more difficult than at other venues. The track suited our car well and that won't be any different on the longer configuration."

Miguel Molina (25/E), Audi Sport Audi RS 5 DTM #8 (Audi Sport Team Abt Sportsline)

- Did the quickest pit stop of all Audi drivers at the Norisring
- Was forced to retire in the 2013 race in Moscow following a collision

"I can hardly wait to finally arrive at the next race. The rounds before the Norisring were very successful for me and I'd like to continue that string now as soon as possible."

Edoardo Mortara (27/I), Audi Sport Audi RS 5 DTM #15 (Audi Sport Team Abt)

- Arrives at Moscow as the driver at the front of the pack chasing the leader of the standings
- In 2013, was turned around on track at Moscow on lap one

"I've now had three really good races in succession, so I'm optimistic for Moscow as well. Even though I personally had a really bad weekend there last year, Mike (Rockenfeller) and Mattias (Ekström) showed what's possible and that the track suits our car."

Nico Müller (22/CH), Audi Financial Services Audi RS 5 DTM #22 (Audi Sport Team Rosberg)

- Has previously run in a formula race on the long track configuration
- Drove the second-fastest lap of all Audi drivers at the Norisring

"I've previously contested a race in a single-seater on the long track configuration. The circuit is very fluid and fits our DTM cars well. The spectators can expect to see a thrilling race and I'm hoping that a large number of fans will turn out again at the Moscow Raceway."



Mike Rockenfeller (30/D), Schaeffler Audi RS 5 DTM #1 (Audi Sport Team Phoenix)

- Clinched the pole position and won the race last year
- Became a father for the first time one day after the Norisring race "With the pole position and victory in 2013 I had a dream weekend at Moscow. Obviously, my wish is to be able to give the right response there following two difficult races. With a little bit more fortune concerning a few minor issues we'll have good chances of being in contention at the front again."

Timo Scheider (35/D), AUTO TEST Audi RS 5 DTM #2 (Audi Sport Team Phoenix)

- Has had the signatures of all the mechanics painted on his helmet
- As driver representative, supported the option of the long track configuration "Driving a DTM car on the Moscow Raceway is huge fun. The grip level is very high and on the new track configuration we've now got a nice long straight with good overtaking opportunities. Yes, traveling there is a bit difficult. But once you're there you'll tremendously enjoy it."

Adrien Tambay (23/F), Playboy Audi RS 5 DTM #16 (Audi Sport Team Abt)

- Is one of two drivers in the field to have scored points in all races so far
- In 2013, missed a podium place at Moscow by only 0.8 seconds "I've got very fond memories of the debut last year where I advanced from position 14 to fourth place and set the fastest race lap in the process. I've scored points in all four races so far I'd like to continue like this."

2013 flashback: one-two victory in Russian debut round

In the first race in DTM history in Russia, Mike Rockenfeller and Mattias Ekström achieved a one-two Audi victory in front of an impressive crowd of 45,000



spectators. On clinching his second victory of the season, Rockenfeller managed to extend his lead in the overall standings to 27 points. The two Audi drivers commandingly set the pace from the start. After 74 laps, they had a more than tensecond advantage over the BMW of Augusto Farfus, who managed to just barely make it across the finish line in third place, ahead of Adrien Tambay in another Audi RS 5 DTM.

Mike Rockenfeller about the Moscow Raceway: "At our inaugural event last year, we received a very warm welcome in Moscow. The track is very demanding. Stable brakes in the car are important because you've got to brake on entering several tight turns. This year, we're driving the longer track configuration, which I like very much. None of us knows the new part yet but even in 2013 it was easy for me to adjust to the new track. I hope the winter in Russia wasn't too severe and that the track is still in such a perfect condition. The two best overtaking opportunities exist in front of the last and the first turn. Both are good places for using the DRS. My personal favorite section is the combination following the second turn."

The Audi Group delivered approximately 1,575,500 cars of the Audi brand to customers in 2013. As one of the most successful models, the Audi A3 has been awarded the title of "World Car of the Year 2014" by an international jury of journalists (combined fuel consumption in I/100 km: 7.1 − 3.2; combined CO₂ emissions in g/km: 165 − 85). In 2013, the company reported revenue of €49.9 billion and an operating profit of €5.03 billion.
